

## **UNIT TITLE:**BECOMING A SONGMAKER

Year 7 and 8 Music

## Three Chords for a Million People

Throughout this lesson block students:

- Identify and define a scale and a triad.
- Identify major and minor chords.
- Identify the diatonic chords I,IV, V and vi and analyse how are they derived in the key of C.
- Apply the chord shapes I, IV, V and vi in the key of C on the piano or a guitar.
- Identify, define, and create a basic chord progression.
- Identify and analyse the I, V, vi and IV chord progression in popular songs.
- Arrange simple chord progressions in the key of C.
- Notate simple chord progression on lead sheet with defined bar lines. As an extension activity, students may notate triads as a musical score.
- Record a chord progression over a drum groove or sample to form a simple harmonic phrase into DAW.

Lesson Objectives	<ul> <li>Identify scales, triads, major and minor chords and the diatonic chords I, IV, V and vi in the key of C</li> <li>Analyse and identify the I, V, vi and IV chord progression in popular songs</li> <li>Experiment with basic chord progressions on the piano and guitar</li> <li>Document and record chord progressions into journal or onto DAW</li> </ul>
